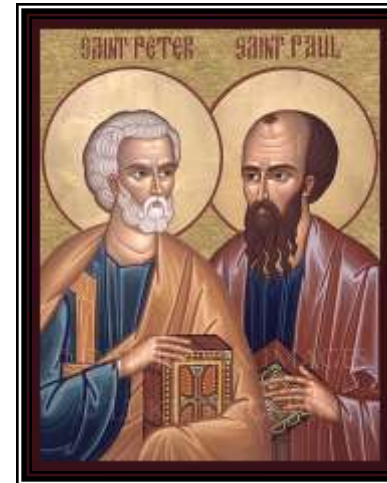

THE GRACE OF CANA

How perfect the story is of our Lady at Cana. So gently she reminds her Son: “They have no wine” (Jn 2:3). In the course of our Christian lives, we often run out of things, maybe even the faith that would let us tell God about it ourselves. But she is there, still present at his side, “they have no love, they have no faith, they have no humility...”



In the Church we are all living off one another’s faith in this way, but especially off the faith of Mary. It was her faith that made our redemption possible. In a very literal sense her faith is the source of the Church’s faith, for with out her faith Christ would not have been born. From all eternity God had prepared her to make that act of faith from which all salvation would flow. This is why we call Mary our Mother, and this is also why it is meaningful for us to regard the Church as our Mother. Faith never means simply your faith or my faith. In one of the prayers in the Mass we say, “Look not on our sins, but on the faith of your Church.” To invite God to look simply upon our individual faith might be little better than offering him our splendid virtue! It is not our faith, but the faith of the Church that we present before him, and that means the faith of Mary, the faith of all those many people who have made the Body of Christ healthy and glorious; we, when we are weak and poor, can live off their faith. “Jesus, looking upon their faith, said to the man, “Son, your sins are forgiven.”

IRENA SENDLER Irena Sendler was a Catholic social worker who saved more than 2,500 Jewish children during World War II. ~ Born on Feb. 15, 1910 outside Warsaw, Poland, Irena’s father was a doctor whose patients were primarily poor Jews. ~ When Germany invaded Poland in 1939, Irena was an administrator in the Warsaw Social Welfare Dept. She was able to provide meals, food and other services to the Jewish residents by registering them under Christian names. ~ When the Nazis later forced the Jews into the Warsaw Ghetto, Irena joined the Polish underground to rescue Jewish children. A young mother herself, Irena and about 30 volunteers (mostly women) smuggled Jewish children out of the ghetto in ambulances and coffins. She would send Jewish children into Catholic churches for “confession,” where they emerged bearing new Christian identities. ~ She recruited non-Jewish families to shelter the children and forged documents to give them new identities. She also kept a record of the children’s true identities so that they could be reunited with their families after the war. Irena then placed the documents in jars and buried them underneath an apple tree in her neighbor’s yard. In 1943, the Nazis arrested Irena and tortured and imprisoned her. She was saved from a death sentence when one of her German jailers was bribed, and she escaped. She was pursued by the Nazis throughout the war. Irena Sendler died on May 12, 2008 at the age of 98.
